L. & A. AMERICAN ARTWORK

Crafted from reclaimed industrial steel, two fire bowls created by American artist John T. Unger are exactly alike. Made of carbon steel and cut with a plasma torch, each sits on a sturdy handcrafted base, and the fire bowls patinate

with age. The massive 50-inch Great Bowl of Fire sculptural fire bowl (L. & A. 000) features stylized flames and a plowcut. The clean-lined, geometric King Boonville 37-inch sculptural fire bowl (L. & A. 01,500) can be powered by wood, propane, or natural gas. John T. Unger, johntunger.com

FIRE IT UP

A good choice for slender side yards or narrow deck spaces, the 23-inch-wide Fire Trough (3) can be powered by natural gas, propane, or ethanol. Rock highlights the raw simplicity of the concrete surround (available in a dozen colors). Glass rocks offer a distinctive complement to the concrete base of the oversize 48-inch Hami (4) (the 26-inch model is pictured on page 47). As much campfire as it is fire pit, the Hami (5) appears to float, requiring a slender base and natural gas or propane fuel source. An optional plinth elevates the fire pit to tabletop height.
